
In the art room, we strive for growth and mastery of standards. Therefore, as long as all other work is current and up to date, any artwork may be revised for full credit until the end of the quarter.

- Earbuds for watching video demonstrations.



Classroom Expectations

Personal Responsibility: Prompt & prepared for class with a wooden pencil and Surface. **Respect:** Silence when others are speaking and during designated times, INCLUDING ANNOUNCEMENTS. Treat art room, materials, your own artwork, and the artwork of others with respect.

Consequences for Minor Infractions

Certain actions in the art room are considered major infractions. These behaviors include, but are not limited to: •Defiance •Not participating in clean up •Intentionally damaging art supplies •Intentionally damaging another student's artwork.

Such actions will result in a learning lunch.

Honor Code and Plagiarism: Student assignments turned in for grading should be the sole work of that individual student. To prevent cheating and plagiarism, students may not collaborate with other students or adults on their assignments unless the teacher has given specific permission to do so. This includes the giving or receiving of information in any manner, including electronically. In situations where collaboration is allowed, the teacher will clearly define what level of collaboration is appropriate. Under no circumstances is it acceptable for two students to submit identical work, unless the assignment included a group component that makes it permissible. Students are encouraged to consult with their teacher regarding what level of collaboration is acceptable prior to completing and submitting their work. HMS Plagiarism Statement: A particular kind of honor code violation occurs with plagiarism. Plagiarism is defined as the use of another's words or ideas and the presentation of them as though they are entirely one's own. Acts of plagiarism include but are not limited to using words or ideas from a published source without proper documentation; using the work of another student (e.g., copying another student's homework, composition or project); using excessive editing suggestions of another student, teacher, parent, or paid editor. Unless directly stipulated by the teacher, collaboration on written work is not acceptable. Students who willingly provide other students with access to their work are in violation of the Honor Code.
